

Festive fraud: Beware of holiday scams

The holidays are here, and while you may be merry and bright, scammers are hoping you're not paying attention while online. Don't let your defenses down and allow online fraudsters to gain access to your personal and financial information. Be on the lookout for:

Online shopping scams. Bogus websites and social media campaigns impersonate major brands and offer too-good-to-be-true deals. These ads entice you to pay for products you'll never receive. Always research before buying.

Credit card fraud. Fraudsters steal credit card information via data breaches, skimming and fake websites. Check bank statements and pending charges to ensure all purchases are yours. Check your online banking often during periods where you're shopping more often, and ask anyone using

your account about their purchases to coordinate.

Social media scams. Huge discounts for followers who share a post, close-out sales or unbelievable holiday deals are likely scams. Most of these posts deploy malware designed to obtain personal information.

Delivery scams. Scammers send out phishing emails and texts disguised as UPS, FedEx, U.S. Postal Service notifications about incoming or missed deliveries. Links lead to phony sign-in pages asking for personal information, or to sites that may be infested with malware. If you know you haven't ordered from a company, or don't have a pending delivery, report the texts or emails as spam or fraudulent and delete them. Always log in to your account through the company website, not through a potentially fake email link.

Charity scams.

Beware phony charities that take advantage of the holiday giving spirit.

Avoid the scammers by giving directly to your favorite local charity.

Fake contests or giveaways.

Beware online promotions that award products, cash or an all-expenses-paid vacation in exchange for an "entry form" that requires personal or financial information. If you receive a suspicious text or email, avoid clicking any links, and make sure to mark the message as spam.

Purchasing Appliances and Electronics: Best Times to Buy

Product Type	Best Time to Buy for Discounts
 Refrigerators and Freezers	Late winter to early spring (March/April); New models arrive in spring, and older models are discounted; Holiday sales (Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day).
 Washers/Dryers, Dishwashers, Ovens and Ranges	September and October when new models are released and older models are discounted; Holiday sales (Labor Day, Black Friday, Presidents' Day, Memorial Day); End-of-year clearance.
 Large Home Electronics (TVs, home theater)	Holiday sales (Black Friday and Cyber Monday); Amazon Prime Days; Late fall/early winter; Other promos, like Super Bowl sales for televisions.
 Smart Assistants and Other Smart Devices	Holiday sales (Black Friday, Cyber Monday); Other sales events, like Amazon Prime Days.
 Air Conditioners, Heaters and Other Seasonal Appliances	Off season (purchase AC units in fall or winter, heaters in summer); Retailers offer bigger discounts when demand is low.

Additional Purchasing Tips:

- When possible, bundle major appliances for significant savings.
- Be on the lookout. When new models arrive, older models drop in price.
- Retailers typically clear out inventory at the end of the year, which means big discounts.
- Local retailers typically try to meet end-of-month/end-of-quarter sale quotas, which could mean flexible prices and/or negotiating.

Pet safety tips

Pet-proof your home to deter your cute and curious family members from encountering electrical dangers this holiday season.

Make sure the electric wires for the tree lights are secured to the branches and not loosely looped. If your cat is a curious climber, it could become entangled in loose cords that could burn or strangle it.

Protect the cord running from the tree to the outlet if your pet likes to chew it. Most hardware stores sell flexible electrical safety cables, covers and PVC conduit.

Visit your veterinarian immediately if you suspect your pet has chewed on a power cord and been shocked. Electric shocks are life threatening and are emergencies.
